A2 Latin Unseen Prose (Livy) Past Paper: 2004 (Decius Magius pays the price for urging his fellow citizens to oppose Hannibal)

1 Translate the following passage into English. Write your translation on alternate lines.

Decius Magius, a leading citizen of Capua in Southern Italy, pays the price for urging his fellow citizens to oppose the Carthaginian Hannibal, who is in Italy trying to gain allies and who has concluded a treaty of alliance with the Capuan senate. Capua had previously been allied to Rome.

The sending of an embassy to Hannibal had been opposed by Decius Magius, a man who would have attained the highest authority if the citizens had had more sense. Hannibal then sent a detachment of troops to garrison Capua.
